# **Group Prep**

### Introduction

Bob Goff stated, "He [Jesus] meant we should love the people we don't understand. The ones we disagree with. The ones who are flat out wrong about more than a couple things. I have plenty of people in my life like that, and my bet is you do too." God calls us to love our neighbors, the ones we don't understand, the ones we disagree with, and the ones who drive us absolutely crazy. We are to love because God first loved us.

## **Discussion Questions**

1. Who or what group of people do you find difficult to love because you disagree with them? Why is it so hard to love people we disagree with? What are some obstacles you need to overcome to love that group of people?

Read Matthew 25:31-40. How can we apply these verses to help us love those we find most difficult?

2. From the sermon, how has the progression of the phases played out in your own life recently? Phase 1: Disagreement. Phase 2: Blame. Phase 3: Demonization. Phase 4: Contempt. Phase 5: Mistreatment. Which "Phase" resonated with you the most and why?

# 3. Here are three strategies to help us love those we disagree with.

a. See their inherent dignity: What does "inherent dignity" mean to you? As Christians, how does our view of others change knowing God created them in His own image? b. Be humble: Is there someone in your life you need to consider more important than yourself? How can you seek to humbly show preference to that person over your own preferences?

c. Give respect: There's an old saying that states, "Respect has to be earned." Do you agree or disagree and why? As believers, how can we respect those we disagree with, regardless of our positional differences?
