Devotional Thought

August 20: 1 Corinthians 12:27 - 13:13

In your opinion, what is an unmistakable demonstration of love? Paul lists several spiritual gifts that lose their significance and impact when done without love. Why is love such an important part of using the gifts God has given you? What will you do to help you remember to use your gifts in a loving way?

August 21/22: 1 Corinthians 14:1-40

What kind of preparation would help prepare you for worship each week? How could your worship experience be different if you prepared properly? How could you participate during the weekend services with your unique gifts and talents in a way that strengthens others?

August 23/24: 1 Corinthians 15:1-58

What do you think is important to pass on from one generation to the next? How would you describe, in your own words, the importance of grace and forgiveness in your life? In what one area of your life have you been stubborn about allowing God's grace to work?

August 25: 1 Corinthians 16:1-24

Who has been generous to you over the years? If Paul were writing a letter to you, what would he affirm and what would he challenge? What is your next step in your spiritual journey?

August 26: 2 Corinthians 1:1-11

Why do people sometimes blame God for difficult circumstances? How do you normally react to hardship or suffering? What can you do this week to help someone find hope in their suffering?
